

Our Mission: To ensure EQUITY THROUGHOUT THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE in the provision of public service to all communities, and to serve as the conscience of law enforcement by being committed to JUSTICE BY ACTION.

Vision Statement: The goal of NOBLE is to be recognized as a highly competent, public service organization that is at the forefront of providing solutions to law enforcement issues and concerns, as well as to the ever-changing needs of our communities.



HOMER L. GARROTT COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

The Homer L. Garrott Community Service Award is presented to an employee (sworn "non-management" or professional staff) who has distinguished himself/ herself through extraordinary service and dedication (on or off duty) toward improving the quality of life of others through their demonstrated and long-term commitment to community service. Many of our employees are participating or orchestrating events to enhance the value and quality of life in communities in which they live or serve. However, we lack adequate occasions to publicly recognize those efforts of our employees' dedication to service. The Southern California Chapter, based on several department executives' recommendations, has taken this opportunity to identify three (3) outstanding community orientated employees.

On November 17, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom appointed Amanda L. Ray as the 16th Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol (CHP); the first woman to lead the Department of approximately 11,000 members. Prior to her appointment to Commissioner, she served as the Deputy Commissioner and was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the CHP.

Commissioner Ray was a 32-year veteran of the CHP and has earned numerous awards and commendations in her personal life and during her professional career with the Department. Commissioner Ray has been a pioneer for women in law enforcement as the first African American female in the CHP's 93-year history to hold the position of Deputy Commissioner for the nation's largest state police agency.

Her vast field experience has allowed her to effectively play an integral role as the Department's first female officer to be assigned as the Special Response Team Tactical Commander during Super Bowl 50, held at Levi Stadium in Santa Clara, CA. She also served as incident commander during a variety of other high-profile events including the Department's response to COVID-19, civil unrest, and wildfires.

As a leader in law enforcement, Commissioner Ray holds firm to the values to serve and safeguard our communities with integrity, enhanced accountability, compassion and understanding. Throughout her career, Commissioner Ray has actively engaged with the communities she serves, seeking every opportunity to participate in outreach events, and active involvement in departmental programs to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security to the people of California.

Commissioner Ray is the youngest of eight children and the proud mother of Kyle Snowden. She holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Psychology from the University of California, Berkeley, and is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation National Executive Institute.

She retired from the California Highway Patrol at the end of December 2022, and is looking forward to traveling, spending time with family and friends and to what her next chapter will bring.



The underlying principle of this award is to recognize a non-law enforcement, individual, business, service, or institution behind the scenes sustaining law enforcement. The recipient cannot be a member of the justice system nor have a direct nexus to the justice system. Members of local, state or federal government are not eligible for this award. This person or organization has supported law enforcement time and again. They have bolstered our profession during our darkest and brightest days. Their patronage has occurred consistently throughout the years. Support can be in a combination of many forms: financial, moral, courageous, or emotional.

<u>FINANCIAL</u>: This person or business throughout the years has stepped forward and assisted law enforcement providing funding in achieving their visions and missions.

<u>MORAL</u>: The person or business has been ethical in their dealings with law enforcement. There has been no expectation of personal gain as a result of their collaboration. Partnerships with the justice system to improve the quality of life were their main objective.

<u>COURAGEOUS</u>: Out spoken, spirited and willing to be a buttress to law enforcement during good times as well as the bad times. The recipient continues to be friend law enforcement, acknowledging that no profession is without flaws.

<u>EMOTIONAL</u>: Has provided the intuitive support necessary for law enforcement and its members to achieve professional and personal goals. The person or entity had unvarying belief law enforcement were heroes before it was an accepted or popular concept.

The "Wind Beneath My Wings Award" is a long overdue acknowledgement to the men and women behind the scene who support the justice system without accolades.

REVEREND JAMES I. JONES

Reverend James I. Jones, Jr was born in Lecompte, Louisiana and reared in Los Angeles, California. Rev. JJ as he is known, attended 66th Street Elementary School, LaSalle Elementary,

Henry Clay, and Washington High (Class of 1974). He was a three-year scholar athlete, at Washington High in track and cross country. After high school, Rev. J.J.

studied for three years at California State University, Long Beach, before gaining employment with the County of Los Angeles. He worked for 15 years with the LA County USC Medical Center as a Clerical Manager in the Medical Records Office and 10 years with Wesco Medical Center as an Administrator

Reverend JJ has been an Associate Pastor of New Life Baptist Church for the last 12 years and is a founder of Gangsters For Christ, a non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation established in December 1992. Reverend JJ has maintained a vision and goal of enhancing lives in communities by nurturing the body, soul, and mind. Positive results and expectation are his objectives by means of engaging in holistic outreach programs. He believes in displaying an attitude of compassion and inclusiveness with those at-risk and the unfortunate. This genuine passion has lent itself to an

impeccable reputation with iconic proportion.

Over the years, he has established a vast and diverse number of relationships in the community. He has leveraged his knowledge, having his finger on the pulse of the community from a grassroots perspective, to forge many viable partnerships and collaborative relationships. His efforts have resulted in numerous community and church affiliations across the region. Most noteworthy are his works with the Watts Gang Task Force, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Clergy Council, the Los Angeles Police Department Clergy Council and several church and community groups.

Rev. JJ's personal interests include football, basketball, track, soccer, baseball, bowling and most of all preaching the Gospel of Peace. Please join NOBLE in recognizing Reverend James I. Jones, Jr. as the 2023 Wind Beneath My Wings Award recipient.



NIKKI WELLS ALEXANDER

SERGEANT NIKKI WELLS- ALEXANDER

LONG BEACH POLICE DEPARTMENT

NIKKI WELLS-ALEXANDER was born and partially raised in South Central Los Angeles, more specifically Watts, in the Nickerson Gardens housing projects. Her parents

later moved she and her sister Traci to Lynwood, CA where she graduated from Lynwood High School. Nikki continued her education at California

State University Dominguez Hills where she discovered her passion for Criminal Justice and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology and also a Master of Public Administration degree.

After a career shift later in life, Nikki decided to pursue a career as a police officer. Since that time, Nikki has served over 19-1/2 years as a sworn officer with the Long Beach Police Department and has worked a variety of assignments such as patrol, Juvenile Investigations, Missing Persons, Human Trafficking, Child & Elder Abuse, Domestic Violence and Recruitment. She currently works as a Patrol Sergeant in the West Division.

On September 20, 2022, history was made in the city of Long Beach, CA, when Nikki Wells Alexander, was sworn-in to become the first Black female sergeant, and the highest-ranking Black woman in the nearly 135-year history of the Long Beach Police Department (LBPD). Long Beach is the 7th largest city in the state of California, and the 2nd largest in Los Angeles County, with a population just below 500,000 residents.

When off-duty, Nikki volunteers her time by actively participating in community service projects with the Cerritos Area Alumnae chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and by speaking at local schools and mentoring groups. In addition to her work and community service, Nikki is the mother of two amazing children – Arianna and Andrew, who keep her busy and grounded.

Nikki intends to carry the charge and continue paving the way for others by mentoring those coming after her. She respects and understands that she is standing on the shoulders of all the bold and courageous Black women of the Long Beach Police Department that came before her, and paved the way for this momentous occasion.



The Shaping of the Southern California Chapter's ACHIEVERS AWARDS

The chapter grew in membership and developed activities that would enhance the role of Blacks in the role of Law Enforcement. In response to the desire of NOBLE Southern California Chapter to provide scholarships for youth to continue their education beyond the high school level, Albert and Roberta Reddick, charter members of NOBLE and patriarch and matriarch of the Southern California Chapter, sat down at their kitchen table and conceived the concept of sponsoring an event to recognize truly outstanding achievers in the field of law enforcement in Southern California.

After two years of informal discussions within the Southern California Chapter the Board approved first Achiever's Luncheon that has resulted in the awarding of numerous scholarship opportunities for deserving youth in the Los Angeles Metropolitan area.

The criteria for selecting these achievers would be a minimum of ten years in law enforcement. They must be outstanding contributors or supporters to law enforcement and those collective contributions must be in concert with the mission goals and objectives of law enforcement in general and NOBLE specifically. In an effort to recognize the profession during Black History month, the chapter held its First Achiever's Luncheon in February 1987. It was held at the Proud Bird Restaurant, and was well attended by professionals and the public at large.

During 2001 the achiever's award event was expanded into a dinner format with newly named acknowledgments "Wind Beneath My Wings" and "Homer L. Garrott" for support of law enforcement and community service respectively.

DUANE ALLEN

CAPTAIN DUANE ALLEN

LA COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT

Captain Duane Allen, Jr. was born and raised in Alhambra, California. He began his career in law enforcement as a police cadet in Pasadena, California. He joined the Los Angeles

County Sheriff's Department in 1988. After graduating from the Sheriff's Training Academy, his first assignments included Pitches Honor Rancho, Altadena

Sheriff's Station, the Community Oriented Policing or COP's Team, and the North Regional Surveillance and Apprehension Team. In 2002, he was promoted to sergeant and was assigned to Temple Sheriff's Station then the Sheriff's Information Bureau where he was the Department's PIO. Lastly, as a sergeant, he was assigned to the position of Executive Director of the Sheriff's Youth Foundation, a position previously held only by Los Angeles Sheriff's Department Captains.

In January 2009, Duane promoted to lieutenant where he worked as a Watch Commander until 2011. In 2011, Captain Allen transferred to Altadena Station where he served as the Detective and later the Operations Lieutenant. In 2014, Lieutenant Allen became the operations lieutenant at Century Sheriff's Station, one of the Department's largest and busiest stations. As the operations lieutenant, Lieu-

tenant Allen managed the day-to-day operation of the Station's 300 plus personnel.

In February 2016, Lieutenant Allen became the Chief's Aide in the Administrative Services Division. In April 2019, Duane promoted to captain and became the unit commander of South Los Angeles Sheriff Station. During his tenure Captain Allen emphasized positive and transparent relationships between deputies and the community which netted positive results during the civil unrest of 2019/2020.

Duane Allen, Jr. was the president of the Black Peace Officers Association of Los Angeles County from 2012 to 2017. During his tenure, the Association focused on five core tenets: Community Service, Mentorship, Training, Networking, and the Promotional Process. This included being the main sponsor of Concerned Black Men of Los Angeles, creating a reading E Pal program for Carver Elementary School, and providing numerous Patrol School Prep and Sergeant/Lieutenant promotional study classes.

Captain Allen has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Vocational Studies from California State University, Long Beach. Captain Allen and his wife Robin are residents of San Bernardino County and have two children Duane III and Savanah. Captain Allen is a licensed private pilot and takes after his grandfather Thomas Allen who along with James Banning were the first African Americans to fly across the United States in 1932. Captain Allen is also a master scuba diver who also enjoys traveling, reading, and cheering for his two favorite sports teams: The UCLA Bruins and the Los Angeles Rams, whom his father played tight end for from 1961-1964. CHRIS WATERS

CAPTAIN CHRIS WATERS

Los angeles Police Department

Captain Chris Waters was born and raised in Los Angeles, California with her Mom, Dad and 2 sisters. She was introduced to the Department as an (LAPD) Explorer (now known as

Cadets) where she served at Southeast Division. She later entered the LAPD Police

Academy September 12, 1988. Captain Waters has worked a variety of assignments and locations while achieving the various ranks within the Depart-

ment. Her positions include Patrol, Central Traffic Division, Detectives, Homicide, Vice, Office of Operations, Civil Rights Integrity Division and Internal Affairs just to name a few. She has had the distinction of being the Adjutant to three Deputy Chiefs including the late Chief Kenneth Garner, while assigned to Operations-West and South Bureaus. She has been a Watch Commander, Vice Officer-in-Charge and the Commanding Officer of Commission Investigation Division, the regulatory arm of the Police Commission. There she served and was mentored by the late John Mack and the longest serving Executive Director Richard Tefank. In 2016, she was promoted to the rank of Patrol Captain after 8 years and 4 attempts. She was assigned to Newton Patrol Division Christmas Day! She later was assigned to Northeast Division as Patrol Captain. She was promoted to Captain II and assigned to Juvenile Divi-

is a graduate of Loyola Marymount University and obtained her Bachelor's of Arts degree in Business Administration; received a Master of Arts degree from California State University at Dominguez Hills in Behavioral Science where she is also an Adjunct Professor in Criminal Justice and advisor for the CSUDH Collegiate Chapter of SCC NOBLE. She has a degree in Biblical Studies from Cottonwood Leadership College and most recently, received her Doctorate in Criminal Justice from California University of Pennsylvania. 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






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Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing
